dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the bod-y that is to be

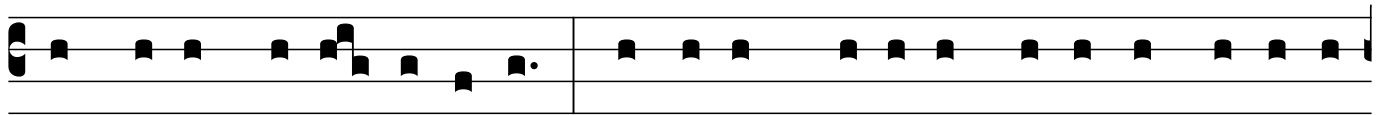
but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some oth-er grain. But God gives

it a bod-y as he has cho-sen and to each kind of seed its own bod-y.

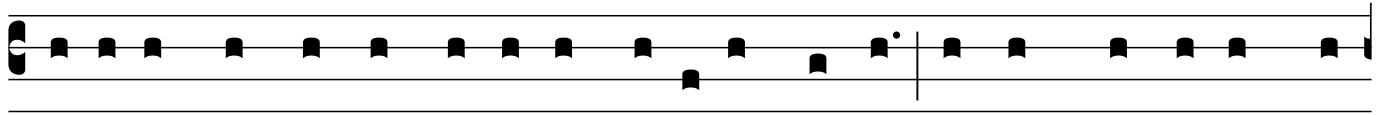
Not all flesh is a-like, but there is one flesh for humans, an-other for an-imals,

an-other for birds, and an-other for fish. There are both heavenly bodies

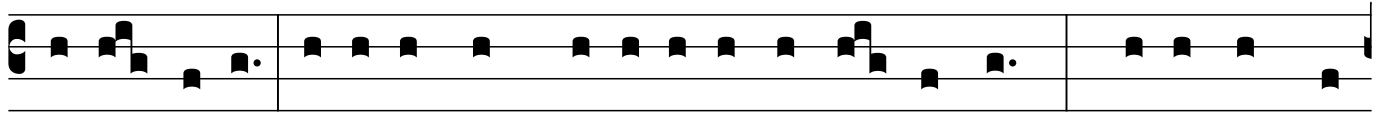
and earthly bodies, but the glo-ry of the heavenly is one thing, and that



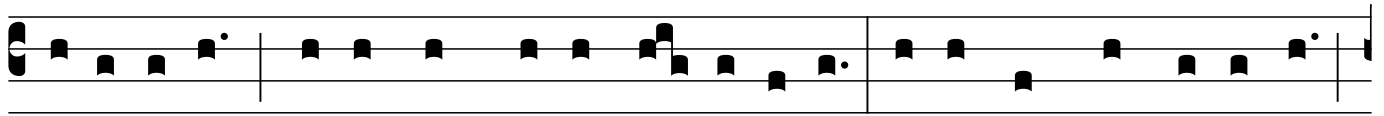
of the earthly is an-other. There is one glo-ry of the sun and an-other



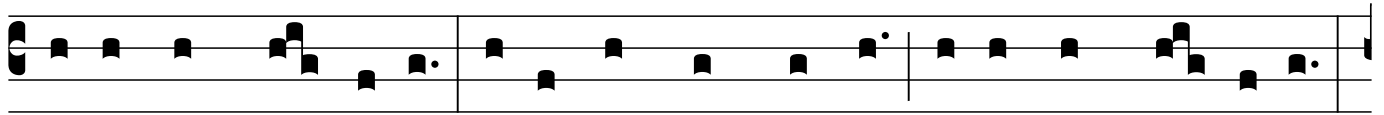
glo-ry of the moon and an-other glo-ry of the stars; indeed, star dif-fers from



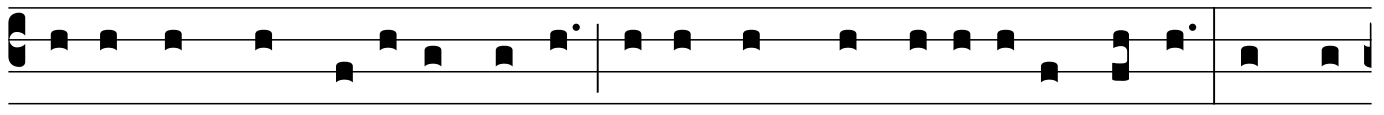
star in glo-ry. So it is with the res-urrection of the dead. What is sown is



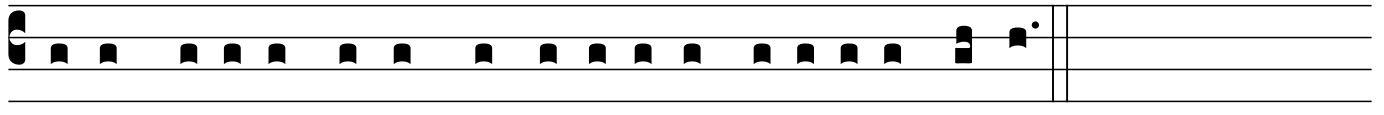
per-ishable; what is raised is imper-ishable. It is sown in dishon-or;
